

THE BOY WHO HARNESSED THE WIND: This year, as we get ready for our Martin Luther King Day celebration (on January 25th), our focus at Driscoll is being drawn from Dr. King's



words, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, what are you doing for others?" With that in mind, everyone in Driscoll School is reading the book, *The Boy Who Harnessed The Wind*. It is the story of a boy named William Kamkwamba, who, at the age of 14, figured out how to make a windmill out of found junk in his village. The windmill was able to make electricity and that electricity eventually helped pump water into his village to prevent the devastation of draught. - Why do you think this is a story worth telling? What does it have to do with you?
- What does it have to do with Dr. King and the holiday/day of service in his honor?

MARTIN LUTHER KING: On Tuesday, January 15th, it was the birthday of Martin Luther King. He was born in 1929, so if he was alive today, how old would he be? _____.

Not only did we read the story of William Kamkwamba (see above), but we also read an article in the TFK about Dr. King and other people who have inspired others.

Who was an inspiration to you? Why? We looked at

quotes by Dr. King and others who believe kindness and paying attention to others is the key to a better society. Do you agree with that? You picked your favorite quotes and then tried your hand at writing your own. Which quotes did you like the best? They are attached so you can discuss them. They are also on our webpage in the Social Studies links section. What 'quote' did you write? Why? We are also starting to write down examples we see of "Being Caught In the Act... of Kindness". Have you begun to notice kind things people do? We also looked at a video about the 'day of service' and a bit of the *video "Martin's Big Words"* by Doreen Rappaport. I like the voice of the narrator and the idea of words being powerful.

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ANIMAL STORIES: Now that your research packets are almost done, you are beginning to think about how to turn what you know about your animal into a captivating story. You heard an animal story by a former 6 th grader. Did it help you think about your own story? In what way? You are making a plan for the characters, problems, setting, and plot of your own story. What problems does your animal have that you might put into your own story? Where is the setting of your story? What have you learned about that place that you will include in your story? How does your animal 'adapt' to that environment? Spend time talking about this. Perhaps your mom or dad know something about the setting of the story or they can help you find out more. Remember, the more you know about the place and your animal, the easier it will be to make the story come alive to your readers.
MATH: This week you have been working hard on your pie chart of your own typical 24-hour day and the ideal day of a former teammate. You learned that it sometimes helps to use a calculator when turning a fraction into a decimal, but sometimes it is faster in your head. For example, if you know that 6/24 = .25 or 25 % - that means that 3/24 = .125 or 12 ½ % because 12.5 is half of 25. That means that 12/24 = .50 or 50%. We also saw what happens to the totals when we round the decimals. Try to explain that. Along with the pie chart of fractions, decimals and percent, you have been reviewing other math topics in the spiral reviews and we have started to look at the types of questions on the mcas test. This is so you are comfortable and familiar with the format when you do take the test in May. ○ What are you getting better at in math?
